The facility was perfect for housing all of the hustle and bustle of many wonderful vendors, and the wonderful display of unbelievably beautiful quilts. I would like to say a big "Thank You" to the members of the Quilt Show committee for all the long hours and hard work they did to make such an enjoyable show.

As you will learn when you read through this edition, your QU board has met and we now have an approved 2002/2003 budget. This important step makes it possible for your committee chairs to focus on the detailed planning of the many activities we have in store for your enjoyment this year. Those that are approaching most quickly are our participation in the **Sully Quilt Show**, the **QU Fall Lecture and Workshops**, and the **QU Fall Quilt-In**. We begin our year on September 8th with the Sully Quilt Show. Susan Tilt and the Arlington Chapter have worked tirelessly over the summer to gather volunteers and demonstrators for this event. Our speaker will be Ami Simms, who has published marvelous books on Picture play quilts, creating scrapbook quilts, how to improve your quilt stitch, etc. Be sure to sign up quickly for the classes.

We have implemented a few changes, this year Marilyn Owendoff has volunteered to head up the Web-Page Liaison, So when you have something that you would like posted on the web-page please send it to Marilyn first, she will proof the information and forward it on to Mary Brick, who has done a terrific job on the Web page.

Quilters Unlimited Executive Board Meeting — July 18, 2002

The meeting was called to order by QU President Linda Roberts at 7:10 pm. at the Packard Center in Annandale Virginia. In attendance were Joyce Tobias (Annandale), Elaine Lynn (Arlington), Mary Johnson (Burke), Suzanne Auble (Centreville), Jean Hansell (Fairfax), Leslie Waters (Falls Church), Barbara Wynne (McLean), Tammy Mannarino (Mt Vernon), Jeri Borsi (Reston), Tommie Curtis (Vienna), Gayle Hindle (Vice President and Vendor Coordinator), Pat Alfredson (Newsletter) Susan Sladek (Programs), Carla Bower (Artisans United), Andrea Gribble (Quilt Show chair).

Treasurer's report to be heard at the next meeting.

Newsletter: Pat Alfredson requested that all items for the first newsletter be sent to her no later than August 10, 2002. The possibility of a fifth newsletter was discussed; no conclusion at this time. The first newsletter will be mailed late August/ early September. The Sewing and Quilt Expo asked that a flyer be placed in the QU Newsletter and information about individuals displaying quilts at the Expo was offered to the chapter presidents.

Quilt Show: Andrea Gribble announced that the show had a profit. Last year there was an attendance of about 5000 which was an increase of 2,000 over the 2001 show. More advertising is planned for next year to increase attendance. The program size will be shortened. The show will be in another building next year; it has classrooms and better lighting. The Show Committee is planning for classes. No teachers have been announced. Over 600 quilts were shown plus 30 wearables and many dolls. Quilt entries will be limited to 3 per member. The ticket price will still be \$5.00 or \$10.00 for a three day pass. All volunteers will pay the one day entry fee but will receive a three day pass. There are plans for production demos by vendors every half hour.

Programs: Susan Sladek that announced the Fall Seminar speaker will be Ami Simms. The event will be October 10-11-12. The lectures will be Oct. 11 at Nova at 10 a.m. and 7 p.m. . Ami's subject will concern how not to make an award winning quilt. The Oct. 10th workshop will be "Picture Play Quilts" and Oct 12 will be "A New Way To Piece", an applique workshop. David Walker will be the speaker at the Annual meeting in May.. His topic will be "Surviving Mid-Life". He only gives two day workshops and the dates are not yet firm but will be at the beginning of May. Ricky Timms will be herein the fall of 2003.

Sully: Elaine Lynn asked for volunteers to work on September 8th. Letters have been sent to chapters.

Fall Seminar: Workshops: Parking at NOVA is a concern since classes are session.

Fall Quilt-In: Centreville is in charge of food. Reston will run the rest of the evening. Attendees will receive one free raffle ticket. as they sign in.

Old Business: No old business.

New Business: How the newsletter is sent to members was discussed. Should it be an E-Mail newsletter and what about those members who are not connected to the Internet were questions discussed. There are some items that have to be received as a hard copy (membership applications, patterns, workshop registrations, nominations, etc.). Linda asked that board members think about ways that the newsletter can be made more useful to members.

By-Laws: Many of the By-Laws should probably be changed to Standing rules. Emily Gross (QU Parliamentarian) is looking over the By-Laws to see what changes should be made.

Expansion of QU: Several quilt groups outside of Fairfax County have expressed interest in joining QU. Discussion followed about the pros and cons. Later discussion planned.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:40 p.m.

About 24 volunteer quilters are also needed for a sit-and-sew in the QU tent during the show. Four quilters are required every hour to give show attendees an opportunity to observe quilts-in-progress.

Demonstrators are being sought for this year's Sully Show and **your** area of expertise is what we need.

All volunteers for the QU tent will receive free passes to the show. It is hoped that every chapter will be represented by providing a demonstrator and/or volunteer quilters for the event.

Five to six demonstrators are needed for September 8th and two of the presentations should include a small hands-on project for the audience.

Quilting techniques may be geared for beginners or seasoned quilters, and may include traditional or contemporary designs, or a combination of styles.

The Arlington chapter of QU is in charge of demonstrations and volunteers.

Create a Picture Play Quilt from conversational fabrics for the special child in your life or for yourself. Make a "Hugs and Kisses" quilt with 3-dimensional set squares in whatever size you like. Learn about photo-transfers, Doodle Quilting, button embellishments, OTF (Off The Floor) Patchwork, and games to play with the finished quilts. Here's a terrific new way to join fabric pieces by hand for quilters who are interested in precision work but with less fuss. Forget the constant flipping to make sure you're "on the line," pin pricks in your thighs, and thoughts of growing a third hand to hold on to your work! There's a better way and when you're done it looks just like traditional hand piecing. You'll be amazed at how easy set-in patches, and complicated blocks can be.

Newcomers:

This is a special time to experience the fun and camaraderie as all 11 QU chapters come together. Come when you can and stay as long as you can. We eat, talk, have show and tell, walk around to see what other quilters are working on, and have door prize drawings throughout the quilt-in. Near the end, we have block drawings and a raffle drawing for major prizes.

Arrival:

Check in at the sign-in table so that you will be registered for door prizes. Remember, dues must be paid to attend the Quilt-In.

What to bring:

Bring your own hand project to work on (no sewing machines); a snack, hors d'oeuvres, or dessert to share; your completed blocks for the drawing; any show-and-tell that you might want to share, and any door prize you want to donate.

What to expect:

Fun, food, friendship, and freebies.

Directions:

Falls Church High School, 7521 Jaguar Trail, Falls Church. From I-495, take Exit 8 East (Arlington Blvd/Rte. 50). Turn right at the first traffic light onto Jaguar Trail. The school is about 100 yards down on your right. The cafeteria is located at the rear of the school.

Parking:

The cafeteria is easiest to reach if you use the parking at either the back or at the right side of the school where the basketball courts are.

Potluck:

Bring a dish to share – snack, hors d'oeuvre, or dessert. To make cleanup go quickly, members are encouraged to use disposable food containers and serving utensils. We do not have cold storage or warming equipment. Many people have food allergies, so please label your dish if it has MSG, artificial sweeteners or if it contains nuts or nut oils of any kind.

Door Prizes:

Chapters and individual members are encouraged to donate door prizes to add to our fun. Quilt-related items are the best! Please no white elephants. Items should be in new or nearly mint condition. Items that do not appeal to quilters should not be donated. Please remember to include your name and address so the winner can send her thanks. Winners, please remember to send a thank you note if you win a door prize.

Raffle Prize:

Don't forget to get your raffle ticket to win big.

Block Drawings:

This year's Fall Quilt-In theme is nature. Each pieced block should be 6½" unfinished. There is a pattern included for those who prefer to paper piece.

The applique block should be 7" unfinished. Choose one or both. Make as many blocks as you like; you get one chance to win for each block. If you have any questions, please contact Sandy Wright.

Blocks

Acorn

The appliqued acorn should be done on muslin (not bleached). The top is plaid and the bottom should be tan, brown, brown-green – you know, "acornish".

Wild Goose

(The diagram is shown on the following page)

A- Green print; cut three 2" x 3½" rectangles

B- Beige background print, cut six 2" squares


C- Brown print; cut one 1½" x 2" rectangle

D- Beige background print; cut two 1½" x 2" rectangles

E- Plaid print; cut two 2" x 6½" rectangles

Goose Assembly Instructions

1. Draw a diagonal line down each of the 2" beige squares (B).
3. Place a beige square on the left corner of the green rectangle (A) with the diagonal line starting at the center of the green rectangle and running to the left bottom corner. Sew on line. Trim the excess fabric away, leaving a ¼" seam allowance.
4. Place a beige square on the right corner of the green rectangle with the diagonal line starting at the center of the green rectangle and running to the right bottom corner. Sew on the line. Trim the excess fabric away leaving a ¼" seam allowance.
5. Repeat for the remaining geese.
6. Refer to the drawing for the rest of the block assembly.

QUILT SHOW NEWS

It's taken those of us who worked on the quilt show most of this summer to recover, but I think if you were able to see the show you'll agree it was worth it. The Dulles Expo Center came through for us, and the show was simply spectacular!! A BIG THANK YOU to all who made our show a success. To all the volunteers, the white glove ladies, the quilt collectors and the committee members - SALUTE!!!! And a big bouquet thank-you to Gayle Hindle, our vendor coordinator, Gail Franchi, design and layout, and Betty Dietz, advertising, who all did yeoman's service in making the show happen. These women were tireless in their endeavors and made an invincible team!!!!

Here's a little info for you about the show: over 600 quilted items were shown, including quilts, wallhangings, wearables and dolls. Approximately 5,000 people attended the show, which was an increase of almost 2,000 people from the previous year's show. As you can see from the attached accounting, we broke even on this show, and actually made a little bit of money. By a little bit of money; however, I mean a small amount in relationship to how much it costs to put on the show. What I'd like to do now is talk about next year's show, some changes we're going to make, and what we as a guild can do to make our show even better.

Next year's show will be again be held at the Dulles Expo Center. This time, however, we will be in the North Hall, which has even better lighting, because it also has skylights. The building is slightly smaller than the South Hall (which is where our show was this year) but it should even out in size. We will have the entire building for our show. We're very excited about the fact that attached to the North Hall is a Conference Center that has large classrooms. We've also contracted for most of the classrooms for next year's show, in order to have classes during our show. This is going to cost us more money, but we think it is well worth it!

The dates for our show will be Friday, May 29 through Sunday, June 1.

Because of the significant increase in cost we are going to have to pay to get the classrooms, and the increased costs in space rental, we're going to have to make a couple of changes to help pay for the increased costs. We think they are very fair, and hope you agree with us. Quilters' Unlimited currently has a membership of over 1,300. Over 500 of you worked as volunteers at the quilt show. That means over 500 people were able to attend the show for free. While we desperately need volunteers and we could not have the show without them, we also need to be able to pay for the facilities. We considered several options to increase revenue, such as increase ticket price, or charging a quilt entry fee. We don't feel either of these options work well for our guild. The best and fairest solution we were able to come up with is to continue to charge \$5 for a one-day pass, \$10 for a 3-day pass, and require anyone who volunteers to work the show to buy a pass, but permit that volunteer to buy a 3-day pass for \$5. What we noticed during the last show was so many people kept coming back day after day. We feel our volunteers will get value for their service in this way, and we will still be able to get sufficient revenues to pay for the rent for the building space.

We feel the show is well worth a \$5 contribution, and hope you all will agree with us. There are few things as entertaining in the DC area for this great bargain price!

The second thing we are going to do to cut costs is reduce the size of our programs by eliminating the extensive text with each quilt from the program. The card that is pinned to each quilt and displayed in the show will still have the quilter's "story," but that information will not be included in the program. Several attendees complained about the large program, and the cost

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has become prohibitive due to size - almost \$6,000 for printing this last show - so we will be more conservative in what is printed in the program. We will still include name of quilt, quilter, chapter, and style of quilt in the program.

Priscilla Stultz (F), has agreed to take on the job of finding teachers for the classes for next

year's show. If you know of any teachers you'd like to see in the classes, and how to get in touch with them, please let Priscilla know.

We have several positions that could use some volunteers. At the moment, we are looking for someone to take over the position of coordinating the Silent Auction. If you are interested, please e-mail me at andrea@gribble@hotmail.com
